

- Over 2000 providers (~1400 physicians, ~600 APRNs/PAs)



## **Project ECHO Program at DH** Homed in **Population Health**




### Upstream factors inform ~80% of health

### Dartmouth Health ECHO Program

- Launched in August, 2019
- Forty-five ECHO courses to date
  - Clinical care 21 (Diverse topics: pain, palliative, COVID, MH, SUD, Integrative med, HIV)

    - Employer ECHOs 3

## **NH Proposed Legislation 2022**

### Bills that could <u>undermine</u> public health

- Prohibiting COVID-19 vaccination requirement by schools and childcare facilities (SB 288)
- Prohibiting school districts from mandating vaccination for school attendance (HB 1241)
- Removing NH DHHS from rule-making authority relative to immunizations (HB 1379)
- Requiring businesses and higher ed institutions to grant conscientious exemptions to vaccine mandates (HB 1210)
- Permitting conscientious vaccine exemption for workers in State medical facilities (HB 1604)
- Making the State immunization registry an Opt-In program for each vaccine (HB 1606)
- Prohibiting State enforcement of Federal laws mandating vaccination or COVID testing (HB 1455)
- Permitting pharmacy dispensing of ivermectin under a standing order (HB 1022)

- Requiring COVID-19 vaccination for school attendance with medical exemptions (HB 1633)
- Expanding post-partum Medicaid coverage for pregnant and parenting women (SB 407/HB 1536)








## Narrative comments 2023



## State Decisions on Medicaid Expansion and Family Planning Programs Affect Women's Access to Postpartum Care


State Decisions on ACA Medicaid Expansion and Medicaid Family Planning Programs, December 2020

- 1) Establish goal
- What is the problem?
- What is your desired solution/outcome?
- 2) Determine available resources
- 3) Identify target
- 4) Understand the process and timeline
- 5) Develop and employ advocacy tactics



## Analyze Stakeholders

- Identify allies and those who can be persuaded
- Assess stakeholder interests and influence
  - Relationship to target
- Identify opponents and potential barriers
- Reach out and build coalitions



## NH SB 175





- Create message that resonates with audience
  - Framing is important
  - Focus groups, polling
  - Elevator pitch
- Identify effective messenger
- Utilize available research and data
- Make it personal: find real-world stories
- Create one pagers/leave behinds
- Understand opposition
  - FAQs
  - Myth/Fact
